As we all continue to adapt to the “new normal” many researchers are looking for ways to record their research so that it can be shared with colleagues who are working remotely, or data easily created in the lab and analysed at home without having to carry precious lab books between work locations.

Electronic Lab Notebooks (ELNs) are an excellent way of doing this, and much more. RSpace is the main ELN supported by the UoE and the purpose of this series of webinars is to introduce new users of RSpace to how the platform can support their research.

All three sessions are open to all research staff and students at the University of Edinburgh, but to support research in varied disciplines and formats each seminar will have slightly different focus and use appropriate examples to illustrate functionality.

In the webinars Rob Day from RSpace will demonstrate the basic features and functions of RSpace Electronic Lab Notebook (ELN). The session will help you how understand how using RSpace can:

- 1) Make you and your lab more collaborative, efficient, and productive.
- 2) Protect your data for years into the future and let you quickly find older records when you need them.
- 3) Make your data more defensible and reproducible
- 4) Bring together diverse data types from scattered locations to create a digital hub for all your research records and workflows.

Session 1 on the 7th July will be focused on traditional wet lab or dry lab research of the type largely found within CSE.

Session 2 on the 15th July will consider clinical trials and medical research and may therefore be of most interest to those in CMVM.

Session 3 on the 23rd of July will look at different types of qualitative research, especially that utilising sensitive personal or commercial data and may be of particular interest to researchers from CAHSS.

Each session will be recorded and made available for those who cannot attend.
